Lethbridge 1891

Lethbridge was a busy little place in 1891.

The settlement – just six years old – became a town, with Charles A. Magrath the first mayor. It went through a variety of growing pains, with definite lines between the various social classes in the community.

Sir Alexander Galt and his son, Elliott T. Galt, were mining coal from the Belly River valley just below Lethbridge, and shipping it east to Medicine Hat or south to Great Falls, Mont., on a rail line they had built the year before.

Through their companies, the Galts provided several hundred jobs. They also provided, in one way or another, most of the social amenities. The four-block town square, now known as Galt Gardens, and the new hospital were just two of the Galt-provided features that made the town habitable.

By 1891, Lethbridge was starting to take the shape it retains to this day.

1891 day-by-day

This is a day-by-day account of life in Lethbridge in 1891. Much of the information came from the old Lethbridge News, the first newspaper published in the community.

During 1891, the News had at least three different editors, and the quality and comprehensiveness of the reporting changed with each change in staffing. In general, the newspapers in the early months of the year had far more news than the ones that were published later.

The News rarely used first names, and often ignored key points in stories – in the apparent assumption that everyone in town would know the details anyway.

Thursday, January 1

The new year started with a heat wave – the temperature hit 46 degrees – but the talk in Lethbridge was about politics, not the weather.

A poll conducted by returning officer Stephen Alexander showed 142 people wanted the young community organized as a town. Only four were opposed.

The results of the vote were sent to the lieutenant governor of the North West Territories, who had the power to proclaim the new town.

A major project drew to a close as 1890 ended. John Kean and James Ritchie completed their contract for supplying ties to the Alberta Railway and Coal Co. About 45 men had worked bringing 54,000 ties and 44,000 mining props from the North Kootenay Pass.

Friday, January 2

Charles F.P. Conybeare was elected by acclamation to the board of the school district. Several others who had been nominated at the annual ratepayers' meeting withdrew when Conybeare entered the race. He succeeded Robert Niven, and joined Hugh McBeth and William Colpman on the board.

Average daily attendance during 1890 had been 75.4 students, although the school board owned only 65 desks. Rev. Charles McKillop, the school inspector, rated the board's work as excellent.

Saturday, January 3

Lawyer William Galliher was recovering after being thrown from his horse on New Year's Eve. The lawyer suffered several serious cuts to his face and head and was unconscious for a couple of hours.

Sunday, January 4

People strolled around the town without overcoats, and it seemed to be more like April than January. The temperature went well above freezing.

Monday, January 5

As the heat wave continued, several young men played football in the town square.

Staff members at Henry Bentley's general store were busy stock-taking. The business had been dissolved, by mutual consent of the partners, but was carrying on as usual.

Tuesday, January 6

A dray team belonging to Sam Davis' livery stable ran away after being left untied. The team ran up Redpath Street, turned down Round and Ford streets, then hit the brick wall of Sam Brady's bakery. The end of the wagon tongue went through the wall, but the horses weren't hurt.

The Lethbridge News published its first issue under a new name, Semi-Weekly News. "The first and chief object of the News will be to work for the advancement of the interests of Lethbridge and its individual citizens," the paper's editorial said.

Wednesday, January 7

The public school started the new year in a new two-storey brick building. The day was spent classifying the children and assigning lessons. Principal Bruce Latimer and teachers Alex Dove and Lena Simpson had appealed to Lethbridge residents to be sure their children were in class so they would be thoroughly organized for the start of the term.

Elliott T. Galt, general manager of the Alber-

ta Railway and Coal Co., bought the old school building and divided it into rooms and offices for rental.

Rev. Charles McKillop urged the annual meeting of Knox Church to secure additional seating, as attendance at evening services was now 180 to 200. Morning services were drawing 80 to 100. At the meeting, James Price, Alex Dove, Joe Dalzell and George Elliott were elected ushers.

Thursday, January 8

Rev. Robert Halsall led the United Christian Endeavor Society's meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Eternal punishment was the topic.

Lucy Bailey was elected president of the Ladies' Aid Society of Knox Church. Margaret Jardine was elected vice-president, Elizabeth McKillop secretary-treasurer, and Elizabeth Fraser superintendent of sewing.

H.B. Rose, a merchant tailor from Winnipeg, was in Lethbridge looking for a location for a store. He said he would move from Winnipeg because of the prosperity of Lethbridge.

William McArthur was looking for business for his new grocery store north of the railroad track. He promised customers he would keep a full supply of the choicest groceries on hand at all times.

Friday, January 9

The North Western Coal and Navigation Co. offered for sale or lease 40,000 acres of choice grazing lands. Charles A. Magrath, the company's agent, said the land was in blocks of townships, well-watered and within easy reach of Lethbridge, in the Milk River Ridge area. Small parcels for farming, as well as Lethbridge town lots, were also available.

Saturday, January 10

William Barclay, general superintendent of the AR&C, left for Great Falls on business.

Sunday, January 11

John McNaughton, who ran a fruit and news stand on Round Street next to Lethbridge House, died at the age of 66. McNaughton was one of the pioneers of Lethbridge, having set up a stationery store in 1884. His news depot and fruit store also featured pipes, tobacco, sporting goods, and Singer sewing machines.

His brother, Capt. J.R. McNaughton, also

lived in Lethbridge.

Bishop Pinkham, of the diocese of Calgary and Saskatchewan, preached in St. Augustine's Anglican Church. He also held a confirmation service, with the rite of confirmation administered to six girls and three boys.

Monday, January 12

High winds could have caused serious problems at the bottom of the incline railway, which carried coal and people from the river valley to the townsite above. A shack near the railway caught fire, and men working on the incline rushed to put it out. The AR&C's hay and stables were in danger until the blaze was brought under control.

Miner Pete Nenish suffered a dislocated shoulder and a sprained ankle when a large piece of coal fell on him while he worked in the mines.

The Catholic school opened, with two teachers in charge.

Tuesday, January 13

A concert was held in the barracks, with proceeds going for fencing at the Lethbridge Protestant cemetery.

North West Mounted Police Corp. R.G. Matthews opened the show with *The Red, White and Blue*. Anna Godwin then sang two songs, *The Better Land* and *I Remember The Old Familiar Faces*. John Curry, Norman Macleod, and W.J. Cleveland also sang. Enid Martin and Lily Deane performed a scene from *The Mikada*. The concert ended with an operetta, *The Pedlar*, played by Ida Conybeare, Anna Godwin, Margaret Jardine, Norman Macleod, and Sgt. W.J. Cleveland. Mrs. Neales played the piano accompaniments throughout the evening.

Wednesday, January 14

A meeting in the Methodist Church discussed the possibility of forming a temperance society. The meeting, chaired by Rev. J.F. Pritchard, resolved that a lodge of the Royal Templars of Temperance be organized. The meeting was held just two weeks after a vote on prohibition showed 143 favoured liquor by license – and only two wanted prohibition.

Thursday, January 15

The lieutenant governor proclaimed town status for the community of Lethbridge.

Sam Horner and Henry Hutchinson, saddlers and harness makers, completed a contract of three sets of heavy horse harness for the North West Mounted Police. The harness, of oak tanned leather with solid brass fittings, were sent to the NWMP's G Division, based at Fort Saskatchewan.

Friday, January 16

I.G. Baker and Co. announced plans for a large stone store on the site of the existing wooden building. The old store would be moved to the rear of the lot to be used as a warehouse.

It was one of several major construction projects in the community.

William Henderson's Lethbridge House was

undergoing extensive repairs, being plastered throughout.

Material for a new opera house was being placed on the ground to prepare for the start of work in the spring.

And Joseph Ritchie was building a two-storey store on Redpath Street.

Saturday, January 17

A brakeman working on the Great Falls and Canada Railway was the prime suspect when a commercial

traveller reported \$200 was missing. The brakeman had been seen picking up money in the dining room of the hotel where the businessman was registered.

The brakeman had taken the afternoon train south, but made it across the border before he could be stopped.

Lawyer Charles C. McCaul was unanimously elected chairman of the board of the new Lethbridge Electric Light and Waterworks Co., with Charles A. Magrath secretary. Plans called for an electric light system in place by spring, and waterworks in operation by the following winter.

Thomas Rookes, formerly of Brandon, accepted the job of managing Lethbridge House. In 1884, Rookes had been one of the first residents of Lethbridge.

MP D.W. Davis and MLA F.W.G. Haultain

ended a brief visit to Lethbridge when they left on the morning stage to Fort Macleod.

Sunday, January 18

Rev. J.F. Pritchard told the members of his congregation at St. Augustine's Church that they would need to co-operate to make the church self-sustaining. He said members must take a personal interest in its success.

At Knox Church, meanwhile, a minister from Niagara Falls, Ont., spoke on the values of temperence.

Monday, January 19

Many complaints were being made about the condition of Telegraph Hill, on the west side of the Belly River. "There is very large traffic

along the Macleod Trail and immediate steps should be taken to make this part of it passable," the News said. The newspaper compared a ride down the hill to a ride in a runaway train.

Tuesday, January 20

Charles A. Magrath, saying it was the duty of every citizen of Lethbridge to come forward when called, declared he would run for mayor.

He had been presented with a petition signed by

almost 200 people, including John Kean, William Stafford, Robert Sherlock, William Henderson, John D. Higinbotham, John H. Cavanah, Morris Barford, Thomas McCaugherty, William Lyall, Lawrence McEwan, John Craig, Rev. Charles McKillop, R. Burton Deane, Fred Champness, William Grist and Arthur J. Hipperson.

Wednesday, January 21

Thirty young men met to discuss forming an amateur athletic club, and 25 of them agreed to become members at \$5 a year.

William Galliher and William Colpman were appointed to secure memberships, while Galliher, Charles Williamson and one of the McNabbs were to ask E.T. Galt for space in the old school building for the club's use.

Thursday, January 22

Druggist John D. Higinbotham was settling in at Alder Allen, his new home at Redpath Street and Westminster Road. The home, in the pointed Gothic and Queen Anne style of architecture, was designed by architects from Toronto. George Cody had the contract for the woodwork, and Arthur Hipperson did the plumbing. The house, built for \$4,200, had 16 rooms, including a library and a butler's pantry.

Daniel Roderick McKay, a conductor, married Sarah Miller of Lethbridge at the home of the groom's father. Rev. Charles McKillop officiated.

Friday, January 23

William Stafford entered the race for mayor after receiving a petition signed by 220 working men. Just days before, Stafford had signed the petition backing Charles Magrath. He said, however, he felt it was his duty to run after getting such strong support.

Members of Lethbridge Lodge No. 2 of IOOF gathered at Clark House for a grand oyster supper. After consuming the bill of fare, the members engaged in toasts, speech and song, until calling it quits at about 11 p.m. with Auld Lang Syne.

Saturday, January 24

William Stafford withdrew from the mayoralty race. He told a meeting of workmen in boarding house No. 2 that he had discovered he would not be eligible because he lived outside the area to be incorporated. He said, however, he would like to see a council include representatives of the mines, the railway, the north end of town, the centre, and the south end.

Ticket agent Herbert Martin, who said he would seek election as an alderman, told the meeting he did not like to see a line drawn between the businessmen and the working people.

William McArthur said the working men should co-operate to secure the rights, justice and fair play to which they were entitled. The working men who worked eight hours a day for \$1.50 to \$2.50 were the "bone and sinew of Lethbridge", he said, and should support the people who would guard their rights.

Charles Payne of Russell House offered the first in a series of select oyster suppers. About 20 people attended the feast.

Sunday, January 25

W.K. Flowerel, a rancher from Helena, Mont., was in Lethbridge to settle claims resulting from straying cattle the year before. Cattle belonging to Flowerel had strayed into the Lethbridge area and destroyed a considerable quantity of hay. The News noted that this was an honorable act, because it was not likely damages could have been recovered through the legal process. Flowerel paid out \$665, including \$100 to W.D. Whitney, \$90 to S.H. Davis, \$125 to M.I. McCaugherty, \$270 to Norris and Banning, \$60 to J.R. Davis, J. Howard, Charles Brown and W.H. Brown, and \$20 to Charles Ross.

Monday, January 26

Charles A. Magrath became the first mayor by acclamation. He was proposed and seconded by Joseph F. Ritchie and John D. Higinbotham. Magrath, who was barely in his 30s, had studied surveying and civil engineering at McGill University in Montreal. He came west in 1877 to work on topographical surveys.

In 1885, he moved to Lethbridge as surveyor and land commissioner for the North West Coal and Navigation Co. He was the first president of the board of trade in 1889.

For council, there were 13 candidates: merchant John H. Cavanah, William Colpman, C.M. Turner, William Henderson, Malcolm McKenzie, Robert Niven Sr., Henry Bentley, Herbert Martin, Nathan Wallwork, Thomas Curry, John Bruce, Job Reed, and Tom McNabb.

Dr. P.F. Size, a surgeon dentist from Calgary, arrived to practice for a week at Lethbridge House. Residents of the community urged him to make Lethbridge his permanent home, because it needed a dentist.

Tuesday, January 27

James Ritchie said in a letter to the News that any Indian seen drinking beer within town limits should be forced to spend the next two weeks cleaning out water closets. He also asked that a public school board meeting be held the following week so he could give his thoughts on how it should operate.

The post office, under John D. Higinbotham, became a Post Office Savings Bank. The move gave working men a place to deposit their savings.

Wednesday, January 28

Essie Nolan and J.D. Smythe, who worked at I.G. Baker and Co., were married at the Roman Catholic Church at 10 a.m. with Father Leonard Van Tighem officiating. Aurelia Roberge and Jennie Nolan were the bridesmaids, and H. Miron supported the groom at the altar. The wedding breakfast followed at the home of Nolan's sister, Ann Gay, on Redpath Street.

Robert Sage was elected secretary of the AR&C's Library and Reading Room Association, replacing C.P.L. Fowler. The library was open from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. each evening, and from 1 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Sundays.

Thursday, January 29

The last meeting of the United Christian Endeavor Society was held, with a talk by Mr. Turner on sowing the seed. In the future, each church in Lethbridge was to have its own branch.

Friday, January 30

Eli Hodder and E.C. Wilson went hunting in the river valley, but didn't find any game. Wilson's dogs, however, did. They returned home an hour after the hunters, with their bodies covered in porcupine quills.

Saturday, January 31

A general meeting of miners was held at 7 p.m. to discuss municipal matters and appoint workers for the election. The miners met in the carpenters' shop near the top of the No. 1 shaft.

Members of the Jim Crow Club also met, at the Crow's Nest, to arrange the club's votes in the municipal election.

Sunday, February 1

Sleigh bells were heard in Lethbridge for the first time that winter. The balmy weather had ended the night before, with the temperature dropping to 16 degrees below zero. Three inches of snow fell.

John Gurn opened his Winnipeg Restaurant on Redpath Street west, next to Rowe's livery barn. Gurn, who had been a chef at Winnipeg hotels and clubs for 11 years, announced he would cater to the wants of the public in a first-class style.

Monday, February 2

The mines were closed to allow workers to

vote for the new council. The school was closed because the building was being used for voting.

John Henry Cavanah topped the aldermanic poll, drawing 223 votes. Cavanah, a native of Ontario, had moved to Lethbridge in 1885 to open a general store.

Henry Bentley, another native of Ontario, came second with 207 votes. He had also arrived in 1885 to start a general store.

William Colpman, who lived in the Battleford area before moving to Lethbridge in 1885, drew 169 votes. Colpman, born in Leicestershire, England, had a lumber business. At 28, he was the youngest member of the new council.

Charles Turner, who placed fourth with 152 votes, was in charge of the AR&C's telegraph line between Great Falls and Dunmore. The Ontario native represented the north ward.

Tom Curry, who drew 142 votes, had been general manager of the I.G. Baker store since September, 1885. He was originally from Ireland.

William Henderson, a native of Edinburgh, Scotland, took 140 votes and the sixth spot on council. He settled in Lethbridge in 1883, and ran Lethbridge House and a building contracting firm.

Tuesday, February 3

Mayor Charles A. Magrath told council it was a red-letter day for the youngest town in the North West Territories. "Who has not unbounded faith in her future?" he asked. Magrath suggested several committees be formed, with one of the council's first acts the appointment of officers – including a clerk, treasurer, and assessor – to help it govern.

Joseph F. Ritchie, a Dominion land surveyor, asked the News to make it clear he was not the same Ritchie who had written to the newspaper the week before.

Wednesday, February 4

John Kean secured a contract to cut 30,000 mining props for the AR&C. Contract price was 85 cents per hundred.

Ernest Taaffe, a clothier from Winnipeg, arrived. He secured space in the Ritchie block, formerly used as a real estate office, for a store to open March 1.

Ed Higinbotham suffered several cuts on his head, shoulders and back in a railway accident near Schreiber, Ont. He had been returning to Lethbridge from a trip to Guelph, where he and his brother John had lived before moving to Lethbridge.

Thursday, February 5

W.L. Ogle of the Gutta Percha Rubber and Manufacturing Co. in Toronto, was the first salesman to try his luck with the new council. He wanted to sell the town a double cylindrical standard chemical engine. The firefighter, he said, would be able to play a continuous steam of chemical compound on a fire, and would be suitable for a town without a water system forfighting fires.

Friday, February 6

A party at The Warren, the home of Charles F.P. and Ida Conybeare, wound up in the wee hours. About 40 people attended. The Conybeares' social evenings, which included music for dancing, were always thoroughly enjoyed.

The managers of the Presbyterian Church met to discuss the possibility of erecting a new building.

Saturday, February 7

A new vertical steam engine and boiler manufactured by the John Doty Engine Co. of Toronto was put into service at the News office. The old engine was too small, so a three-horse-power one was brought in its place.

Sunday, February 8

A woman created a bit of a stir when she arrived in Lethbridge and claimed to be the first wife of a prominent local businessman. She said she had been deserted in Ballymoney, County Antrim, Ireland about eight years earlier – with new children, one less than a year old. She promised she would go away if the man she claimed was her husband – living in Lethbridge with a new wife – would provide money for herself and her children.

Monday, February 9

A concert in the messroom at the NWMP barracks raised \$95 for Father Lacombe, who said the money would be turned over to the Sisters of the Convent. The concert was basically the same as one given earlier in Macleod, and most of the performers were from there. Advance tickets for the concert cost 50 cents, and reserved seating cost 75 cents.

A daughter, Julia, was born to Alister and Christina Pryce.

Tuesday, February 10

E.C. Wilson, a resident of Macleod and Lethbridge for seven years, left for California. He had sold his drug and stationery business to Joshua Little. A few days before he left, Wilson was honored with a banquet by members of the Lethbridge Gun Club.

The News said J.F. Guerin, a dental surgeon, would revisit Lethbridge. "For the convenience of those who cannot call in the day time, Mr. Guerin will use the electric light for night operations."

Wednesday, February 11

William Spencer was named town clerk and assessor at a salary of \$200 a year. William Galliher was named town solicitor and treasurer. Town council made the appointments in a meeting held in a vacant room in the school. Council had free use of the room as long as it paid for the extra caretaking duties that resulted.

Thursday, February 12

Elliott T. Galt was appointed president of Lethbridge Electric Light and Waterworks Co., with Charles F.P. Conybeare named vice-president and Charles C. McCaul secretary-treasurer.

Dan McInnis of the No. 1 shaft left on a business trip to Cape Breton.

Friday, February 13

Shop hands at the No. 1 shaft practiced their football skills at noon, as they had for several days. They were preparing to challenge merchants of Round Street.

Saturday, February 14

H.G. Walsh of the Bell Telephone Co. in Winnipeg arrived to make the final arrangements to start service in Lethbridge. Most equipment had already arrived,. with the exception of a few poles. About 50 subscribers were expected. A separate wire from Central to each subscriber was planned – almost 27 miles in total

Sunday, February 15

Rev. Charles McKillop of the Presbyterian Church preached a special sermon on lying. He said it had come to his attention that several men who had voted in the municipal election were actually not entitled to do so. His sermon contained a special reference to the nature of the oath.

Monday, February 16

Payday at the mine. The total amount paid out was more than \$50,000, handed out to 588 men working the mines and 398 others working in the railway and work shops. Several miners drew more than \$100 for the month, with two getting \$117 each.

Tuesday, February 17

Thomas Kirkham called a meeting of the Lethbridge Turf Association, which was building a track just north of the Dunmore railway line about two miles east of Lethbridge. Directors elected were George Young, Howell Harris, G. Tuttle, blacksmith Albert Keyes, John Bright, Henry Bentley, G. Patrick, Thomas Kirkham, William Galliher and Frank Colpman.

A bit of entertainment in the evening led to appearances in police barracks court two days later. Five people were fined for being drunk and disorderly, and had to pay fines ranging from \$5 to \$20, plus costs.

Wednesday, February 18

Calgary Mayor James Reilly, a candidate in the federal election, came to Lethbridge to declare the town would get full justice if he became MP. But D.W. Davis, the incumbent, was also at the meeting, and said he had heard no reason why Reilly should be elected rather than himself. Harry King stood up to say Lethbridge should support Davis.

John Craig, furniture dealer and undertaker, announced plans for a new store at the corner of Smith and Ford streets. The building would have a two-storey front and three-storey rear.

Thursday, February 19

Eighteen couples took horse sleighs to a surprise party at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J.R. Davis, about four miles down the Belly River from Lethbridge. The party, featuring the sounds of a string band, lasted until 2 a.m.

The library held a special auction of 1890 periodicals and newspapers.

Friday, February 20

Town council set fees for business licences, including \$100 for transient traders; \$20 for a bowling alley with one alley, and \$10 for each additional alley; \$14 for single drays and \$20 for double drays; \$50 for livery stables; and \$10 for water carts.

Saturday, February 21

Miners Frank Crawford and Angus Corrigan, from Nova Scotia, learned that their brothers had been killed in the Springhill mine disaster.

Sunday, February 22

No services were held at St. Augustine's Church. The caretaker arrived too late to adequately heat the building in time.

Monday, February 23

Poles for the town's telephone system arrived, with the system expected to be in operation in a few weeks. Charles Turner would be in charge of the central office, which was planned for the Ritchie block.

Tuesday, February 24

New stock – men's furnishings for the spring and summer, including novelties in ties – went on sale at John H. Cavanah's.

A dog that made its way into the post office broke a window to get out. A show bottle and a large lamp were also broken. The dog had no

tag – but it served as a reminder that a dog bylaw was needed.

Wednesday, February 25

The annual meeting of the Lethbridge branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society was held in the Presbyterian Church. John Duff was elected president, and the resident ministers of the town were named vice-presidents.

Thursday, February 26

Miners at the incline railway had a scare when a link broke between the two forward cars as they were riding up the bank. The miners jumped off the remaining

six cars as they started down the hill. The cars also caused a scare at the bottom of the hill, where William Stafford Jr. helped Robert Sage, who had slipped as he tried to get away from the track, get out of the way.

James and Elizabeth Harper had a baby girl, Georgina.

Friday, February 27

George Robinson, a clerk at the post office, bought the book and stationery business of P.R. Neale.

Saturday, February 28

A public meeting was held at the AR&C's No. 3 boarding house to discuss politics. Charles C. McCaul, William Stafford, Malcolm Campbell, Mr. McDonald, Charles Magrath, and Mr. Bentley addressed the electors – and all supported D.W. Davis. Mr. McKenzie spoke in favor of James Reilly, the Calgary mayor. The meeting ended with three cheers for Queen Victoria and Davis.

Sunday, March 1

A.F. Tero, a watchmaker and jeweller from Regina, was preparing to open a store in Dr. Potts' old office.

Monday, March 2

Town council decided farmers in the area

would not be subject to licence fees if they sold their produce and dairy products in Lethbridge.

Charles Farmer was sentenced to two months with hard labor for stealing a revolver from William Arrowsmith. Mr. Justice Macleod heard that the revolver, valued at \$12, as well as \$15 in cash, were found on Farmer.

Sherlock and Higinbotham's drygoods emporium opened next door to the post office.

Tuesday, March 3

Mr. Lane and Mr. Lambert of Chicago arrived in Lethbridge to look at the

possibility of a business. If a suitable location could be secured, they said, they would open a grocery or crockery store.

Wednesday, March 4

The barracks mess room was filled for a smoking concert. The music was provided by members of the NWMP, with the K Division String Band opening the show with some lively music.

A girl, Helen, was born to Rev. Charles and Elizabeth McKillop.

Thursday, March 5

In the federal election, Lethbridge residents cast 277 votes for Davis and 103 for James Reilly. Davis took the seat by winning every polling division – including those in Calgary, where Reilly was mayor.

A son was born to Lawrence McEwan, a jeweller, and his wife Minnie.

Friday, March 6

The frozen body of North West Mounted

Police Const. James Herron was found on the prairie between Kipp and the St. Mary's River. It was believed he had become snow blind and dazed. A dog belonging to the 23-year-old constable had returned home safely.

Herron was one of 29 constables in the K Division, based in Lethbridge. There were also six non-commissioned officers.

Saturday, March 7

Joshua Little's drug store was advertising a large assortment of drugs, toiletry items and pipes, freshly arrived from the east. Little offered 24-hour service on prescriptions. John D. Higinbotham, meanwhile, was offering Ricksecker's Perfumes in cut glass bottles that he said would be perfect for presents.

Sunday, March 8

Guests from all corners of the west were staying in Lethbridge hotels. They included P. Lambert of Milwaukee, John Parsons of Winnipeg, W.J. Barker of Battleford, J.W. Rankin of Medicine Hat, R. Carruthers of Wapella and G.M. Leishman of Vancouver.

Monday, March 9

High winds, accompanied by west snow, caused the Macleod-Lethbridge stage to be blown over. The stage driver, Frank Pollinger, and his eight passengers were unhurt. Pollinger was able to keep a firm grip on the reins so the horses stayed under control. He and the passengers went to the house of A.J. Whitney, where they spent the night, then continued to Lethbridge the next day.

The body of Const. Herron was taken to Macleod for an autopsy. It revealed a bullet hole behind Herron's left ear.

Tuesday, March 10

The town's bank account was \$900 richer, thanks to applicants for licences. Licences were granted to the following: F.B. Roberge, hotel; Moses Waters and Sam Brady, three water wagons; Lethbridge Cartage Co., three double drays; Fred Cuthbert, Nickel Plate Saloon; John Mackenzie, Mackenzie Hotel; Henry Howard, one water wagon and one double dray; William Henderson, Lethbridge House, one billiard table and one pool table; Alex Anderson and Sons, boarding house; Fred Whear, Whoop-Up Saloon; John Gurn, hotel; Hugh Malloy, two

double drays; Frank P. Burk, liquid refreshment house; Cyril Begin, restaurant; E. Coe, one double dray; and Andrew Anderson, one double dray.

The infant son of Lawrence and Minnie McEwan died.

Wednesday, March 11

Insp. T.W. Chalmers of the NWMP was transferred to Lethbridge from Battleford.

Crews at the No. 1 shaft produced 333 tons of coal – the largest daily output ever.

Clarence Lowther broke his leg while quarrying clay near Six Mile Coulee. He had not noticed that a large piece of frozen clay above him had become loose.

Thursday, March 12

Dr. C.E.R. Vidal, former house surgeon of Montreal General Hospital, arrived in Lethbridge to be assistant to Dr. F.H. Mewburn. Vidal had graduated from Toronto University and Bishop's Medical College in Montreal.

A coroner's inquest into the death of Const. Herron ruled he had tried to fire a shot to get attention, but his hands were frozen, so he missed and hit his head instead.

Corp. Collins and Const. Harvey were still confined to their quarters recovering from snow blindness suffered in the search for Herron.

Friday, March 13

Town council adopted a tough bylaw – the town's second – for fire protection. Among the rules it introduced were limits on where hay and straw could be stored. No person would be allowed to have more than 100 pounds of gunpowder or more than two cases of cartridges except in a building designated for storage, and at least 600 feet from other inhabited buildings. The bylaw called for fines of between \$5 and \$100.

G. Parker and J. Scott of the Hudson Bay Co. arrived in town to work on the transfer of the I.G. Baker store to the Bay.

Saturday, March 14

A baby girl, Lucy, was born to John and Lucy Brack. John Brack was a conductor.

A fire broke out in a building on Ford Street, but was put out before much damage was done. A high wind was blowing at the time, so the results could have been disastrous.

Sunday, March 15

Winter was over – or so the people of Lethbridge believed. Bicycles could be seen almost every night on the dry and dusty streets of the town.

It was the start of enumeration at all post offices in Canada. The salaries of postmasters were largely determined by the amount of business done.

Monday, March 16

Prof. Tyndall gave an interesting reading seance at the barracks. Mayor Charles A. Magrath selected a committee to watch over the events. Tundall was able to solve a hoax murder, find concealed cards, and about a dozen other wonders.

James Frederick Malkin, bookkeeper for Sherlock, Freeman and Co., returned by train from his trip to England.

Nicaise Ignace, general manager of the Sheran mine across the Belly River from Lethbridge, was robbed of \$750. The money had been hidden between two mattresses in a bed in a log house at the mine. Town constable Charles Ross was alerted but could find no trace of the robber.

Tuesday, March 17

Several citizens reported that at 8 a.m. they could see Medicine Hat from downtown Lethbridge. Houses, the surrounding hills, and the river valley all appeared to be suspended in the air.

I.G. Baker's store closed.

William Bentley auctioned all of Rev. J.F. Pritchard's furniture and household effects. Pritchard said he had decided to give up house-keeping.

W.D.L. Hardie, assistant superintendent of the AR&C, went to Great Falls to pick up his family, which was moving to Lethbridge. They planned to live in a house that was nearing completion near the No. 2 shaft.

Wednesday, March 18

Work was starting on the new hospital. Mr. Clutson of Regina was in charge of the early stages of construction. The architect was expected to arrive within days to supervise construction.

Benjamin Whitney was awarded the tender for fencing the new race track. Shareholders were to pay \$5 each for the work.

The congregation of Knox Church decided to build an addition instead of a new building. The \$3,000 expansion would take capacity of the church to 400 people.

Thursday, March 19

Mayor Charles A. Magrath was elected president of the Lethbridge Lacrosse Club at an organizational meeting in the real estate office of J.F. Ritchie. Henry Bentley was named vicepresident, with William Galliher captain and Bruce Latimer secretary-treasurer.

Friday, March 20

The AR&C asked in an advertisement in the News for tenders for the water supply for Lethbridge. A tariff would be charged to the public.

The cross-pieces for the telephone poles were being put in place.

The money stolen from the Sheran mine was found, cached in an outbuilding at the mine.

Saturday, March 21

The former I.G. Baker store reopened as a branch of the Hudson Bay Co. Norman T. Macleod, the only Baker employee who did not join the new firm, would remain in charge of the Baker meat market. Thomas Curry, I.G. Baker's manager, would be manager of the Bay store

Arthur Hipperson let the contract for the erection of a large brick store on Redpath Street, at a cost of about \$2,500.

The enumeration of the Lethbridge Post Office ended, with a count of 2,869 items mailed during the week. Postage paid totalled \$380.32.

John and Agnes Cowan had a son, John.

Sunday, March 22

Residents on the north side of the railway tracks were circulating a petition calling for a ward school to serve the children of the area. There were 40 to 60 children there, considered enough for one teacher.

A teacher hired for the school would be the fourth in the town.

Monday, March 23

Fred Godwin was elected president of the Lethbridge Lawn Tennis Club, with John D. Higinbotham serving as secretary. Several new members – P.H. Vibert, Dr. Charles Vidal, George Mickie, W.G. Dickinson, Manford Freeman, Hugh McBeth, and Joshua Little – joined.

Thomas Curry was elected president of the Lethbridge Kickers football club, with Thomas Graham captain. The club's first match of the year, against the Lethbridge Rovers, was set for Good Friday. An exhibition lacrosse game was planned for after the football game.

Tuesday, March 24

Staff Sergeant W.J. Cleveland left the NWMP to go into partnership with Joshua Little in the pharmacy business previously run by E.C. Wilson. Cleveland had been with the police for $2^{1/2}$ years.

Wednesday, March 25

Stephen Alexander, a law clerk at the offices of Galliher and Conybeare, crushed the big toe on his right foot while helping to dig a pit for the traps of the gun club. He struck his foot with a crowbar.

Charles Payne, formerly of the Russell House, leased the new Cosmopolitan Hotel for two years. The Cosmopolitan was under construction on Baroness Street.

Thursday, March 26

A two-storey addition was being built at the rear of Clark House. The first floor was for sample rooms for commercial travellers, with bedrooms upstairs. The requirements of increasing patronage demanded the enlargement of the hotel.

The board of the Lethbridge school district decided a school was necessary on the north side of the tracks. Board members decided to find out how many children lived on the north side, and to determine the cost of land and cost of a suitable building.

Friday, March 27

Good Friday. Charles Turner was advertising for a young girl to learn telephone operating, as well as for a boy to learn telephone operating and to work nights.

Saturday, March 28

One of the loveliest snow storms of the season hit the Lethbridge area, with a depth of six to eight inches on the ground by nightfall.

Sunday, March 29

Robert Sherlock left on the evening train for the east, where he was to be married to Ellen Freeman, the sister of his partner. He was expected to be gone about two months.

The snow melted.

Monday, March 30

Work started on William Henderson's new home on the Duff estate.

William Ott was setting up a new barber shop in the stand previously occupied by William McDougall's show shop. Ott was from Regina; McDougall was headed for Great Falls.

Tuesday, March 31

A. MacAulay of Portage La Prairie was in Lethbridge to look into opening a tailoring shop.

A bylaw calling for the licensing of dogs was approved. The tax was set at \$2 for a male dog and \$4 for a female one. Tags were priced at 25 cents.

Wednesday, April 1

Dr. L. George De Veber was settling in to his new offices in Lethbridge, at Little and Cleveland's drug store, while waiting for permanent quarters in the Ritchie block to be ready. De Veber came to Lethbridge after practicing in Pincher Creek and Macleod.

Thursday, April 2

Capt. R. Burton Deane was elected president of the Lethbridge Cricket Club. Fred Godwin, manager of the Union Bank, was vice-president, with William Colpman captain.

Another meeting saw the Lethbridge Rugby Football Union formed, with Henry Bentley president and John H. Cavanah vice-president. W.J. Cleveland was named captain with James Ashcroft vice-captain.

Friday, April 3

The News called for merchants to meet to decide on early closing hours for the summer. The stores could close at normal times between November and March, the News said, but suggested earlier times – 7 or 7:30 p.m. – for the rest of the year.

Saturday, April 4

Ernest Taaffe's One Price House on Redpath

Street was offering some "very nobby" suits, plus 300 pairs of pants, the latest in hard and soft hats, and a big stock of dress and regatta shirts. Miners' caps were due to arrive in a few days.

Sunday, April 5

Thomas Mahaffy, of Mahaffy and McClinskill, Battleford, arrived. The company planned to open a general store in a building going up on Redpath Street.

Monday, April 6

Furniture dealer John Craig arrived after four weeks on the Coast. He had been laid up with *la grippe*, which had forced the cancellation of a proposed visit to eastern cities.

Mr. and Mrs. George Bremner of Chater, near Brandon, were expected to arrive. Mrs. Bremner was a sister of Elizabeth McKillop.

Tuesday, April 7

J.H. Lawrence was looking for more business through an ad in the News. Lawrence, a furniture dealer, said he could handle cabinet making, general jobbing, and undertaking. His store was opposite Rowe's livery stable.

Wednesday, April 8

Members of the Lethbridge Board of Trade, which had been one of the strongest backers of incorporation, met in the Lethbridge House. They decided to bill the new town for \$240 – the amount that had been spent in promoting the idea of incorporation.

George Levasseur of Pincher Creek bought the Lethbridge-Macleod stage, which had been owned and operated for four years by the I.G. Baker Co.

Thursday, April 9

Clerks employed by various businesses in Lethbridge agreed at a meeting to petition their employers for early closings. They wanted businesses to close at 7 p.m., rather than 8:30 p.m., on all nights other than Saturday nights, pay nights, nights preceding holidays and any other nights the business owners chose.

Most businesses agreed with the idea within days.

The school board decided to build – at a cost of \$1,500 – a ward school north of the tracks that would serve the 56 children there.

Friday, April 10

The first day of the 1891 census.

Ernest Taaffe tried to increase his business by offering coupons in the News. One allowed a dollar off the price of any suit in stock. The other allowed 50 cents off a purchase of \$5 or more.

George Cody and William Cluston won the contracts for Lethbridge's first sidewalks.

Saturday, April 11

Mr. Milward of Calgary, census commissioner for Alberta, was in Lethbridge to instruct William Heron on the work in the Lethbridge area.

Heron had already started the job, and had a considerable number of names.

Sunday, April 12

Dr. O'Gorman, formerly of Cobourg, Ont., arrived in Lethbridge. He hung out his shingle at Clark House.

Monday, April 13

The Lethbridge School Board was advertising for a female teacher with a second-class normal school certificate. The move was made because one teacher had 66 students in her class.

Tuesday, April 14

The excavation for Arthur Hipperson's new block on Redpath Street was almost completed. The clay was being moved to low spots along Round Street.

Former Lethbridge resident Thomas McPherson was critically injured when the boiler of his train locomotive exploded in Washington State. McPherson had been employed by the AR&C until the fall of 1890.

Wednesday, April 15

Lethbridge merchant Robert E. Sherlock of Sherlock, Freeman and Co. married Ellen Freeman in Hamilton, Ont. Sherlock's new wife was a sister of his partner.

Thursday, April 16

Edgar Dewdney, Minister of the Interior, announced in Ottawa that a rail line would be built from Lethbridge through the Crowsnest Pass that summer.

Friday, April 17

John Craig started an auction sale at 3 p.m. to dispose of a variety of items, including bedroom suites, easy chairs, rattan goods and lounges.

Mayor Charles Magrath sent a cheque for

\$1,627.30 to the mayor of Springhill, N.S. for the relief of widows and orphans after the mine explosion there.

Saturday, April 18

Electric bells were placed in the principal rooms at Lethbridge House.

The new store on Redpath Street, operated by Mahaffy and McClinskill, was completed.

Sunday, April 19

New sidewalks were under construction in the downtown area.

David McNabb, an engineer, and his wife Isabella, had a daughter, Florence.

Monday, April 20

The Cosmopolitan, billed by Charles Payne as the only \$1-a-day first-class house in the North West Ter-

ritories, opened. The building had previously been the Whoop-Up Saloon. Fred Whear was the proprietor of the 22–room hotel; Payne leased the restaurant and bedroom facilities.

Norman Torquel Macleod of Lethbridge was appointed deputy sheriff for the judicial district of Southern Alberta.

Town council decided to pay the bill from the Board of Trade for the efforts to organize incorporation.

Tuesday, April 21

Henry E. Stanbury started work on a 50-foot by 26-foot two-storey building on Round Street, where his blacksmith shop had previously stood. The lower storey was to be used for a blacksmith and wagon shop, the upper for a public hall.

Wednesday, April 22

Thursday, April 23

A sociable crowd of young people gathered at the Arthur Hipperson residence for a party which lasted until 1:30 in the morning.

Friday, April 24

Barber Fred Bourdon called for tenders for the construction of a house south of the barracks. Meanwhile, the double house owned by Edwin Coons, a clerk at the AR&C, was almost finished.

Saturday, April 25

Margaret Magrath, the wife of the mayor, left for a two-month trip to the Coast, via Helena, Mont., and the Northern Pacific Line.

A fire in a pile of rubbish – bark from telephone poles

 was put out. The fire was close to Henry Bentley's lumber yard, so it could have caused a major loss.

Sarah, the wife of merchant John Cavanah, gave birth to a daughter.

James Patrick and Henrietta Nunn, both of Lethbridge, were married by Rev. Charles McKillop.

Sunday, April 26

Sir Alexander T. Galt was at Coaldale, his son's residence in the river valley, after arriving from Great Falls in a special train the previous day.

Steve Cleveland had a close call when he was thrown out of his rig after his horse got out of hand.

Dr. L.G. DeVeber took charge of the choir at St. Augustine's, with Tom Rookes, manager of Lethbridge House, as organist.



Monday, April 27

A motion to have trees planted in the public square was defeated by town council. Councillors decided to wait until a waterworks system would allow the trees to get the nutrition they would need.

The Rovers, captained by Thomas Graham, and the Lethbridge football club, captained by A. Neidig, met in a match on the association grounds. The game ended in a 1-1 tie.

Jane Niven was presented with a gold watch by Robert Ripley, James Price, George Elliott, W. Bailey, John D. Higinbotham, George Johnston, and the pastor of the Knox Church. The gesture was in recognition of her services to the choir.

Tuesday, April 28

William Henderson started building a store next to Lethbridge House. It would be used by Henry Pace as a jewellery store. Henderson had 60,000 bricks in a kiln, and was building a second kiln.

Wednesday, April 29

A storm dumped four inches of hail along the rail line between Lethbridge and Dunmore.

Sir Alexander Galt left for the east. Before leaving, he said there were no plans to build the Crowsnest rail line that year – but it would be put through in the near future.

Thursday, April 30

Two trains a day were running between Lethbridge and Great Falls.

The mine at the incline produced 560 tons of coal, the largest daily output ever.

Friday, May 1

A new map showing the plan of Lethbridge was issued. The map, available at the office of J.F. Ritchie, land surveyor, showed the newest additions as well as the principal buildings and coal shafts.

Saturday, May 2

Enumerator William Heron completed the census of Lethbridge. Guesses on the population number were starting to surface, with the News guessing 2,200.

Sunday, May 3

Rev. J.F. Pritchard announced he was leaving

Lethbridge. He was going to Miles City, Mont. He was also named chaplain of the United States troops at Fort Keough.

Monday, May 4

William Miller and Annie Clinton, both of Lethbridge, were married by Rev. Charles McKillop.

J. Collins and M. McDoo were fined \$4 each for breaking the Sabbath. They were found guilty of unloading a load of hay.

Tuesday, May 5

J.B. More of Winnipeg was appointed superintendent of the construction of the new hospital in Lethbridge. The work was expected to last all summer.

James Fleming suffered serious injuries when he was caught between two cars beneath the chute at the No. 1 shaft.

Wednesday, May 6

The school board bought an acre north of the tracks for the new school. School trustees also agreed to hire Miss McKibben, of Manitou, Man., as a teacher for \$600 per year. They also agreed to let the town use a schoolroom for municipal courts.

John O'Hanley and Maggie Malloy were married by Father Van Tighem.

C.D. Rickards, assistant at the Dominion lands office for the previous year, was heading to the office in Calgary.

Thursday, May 7

About 30 couples attended a social hop in John Craig's old furniture store. The store would soon become home to a flour and food store operated by J. Kuhn and son of Balmoral, Man.

Friday, May 8

The News office was accepting orders for rhubarb plants at \$2.50 a dozen.

Robert Neering was hurt when he was crushed between two cars in the rail yard. He had been acting yardmaster for about two months.

Saturday, May 9

Howell Harris reported that the grass on the east side of the Belly River looked better than it had for several years. The mild winter and

favorable spring meant the calf population would be large, he said.

Ernest Taaffe announced he had decided to give up business in Lethbridge and return to Winnipeg.

Sunday, May 10

Henriette Galt Lethbridge Stafford, the daughter of William Stafford and his wife, died at the age of six years and seven months after a lingering illness. Services were conducted the next day by Rev. Charles McKillop.

Monday, May 11

Town Inspector Charlie Ross wore his new navy blue uniform for the first time.

A toll telephone was placed at James McKay's residence in the river valley. The cost of making a call was set at five cents.

A representative of the Manitoba Board of Underwriters was in Lethbridge preparing an insurance map of the business streets.

Tuesday, May 12

Bricklaying on the walls of the new hospital was well underway. The building was on a high bench overlooking the river valley, where just 20 years earlier the last great Indian battle had taken place. The hospital would be a monument to Sir A.T. Galt and the interest he had taken in the town.

Wednesday, May 13

A 12-foot sidewalk was being built along the west side of the Round Street. A six-foot sidewalk was going in on Ford Street.

Urban renewal was becoming commonplace in the six-year-old community. Henry E. Stanbury's old blacksmith shop on Round Street was being torn down to make way for a new building.

Thursday, May 14

Alder Allen, the new house of John D. Higinbotham, was being given a new coat of paint. The house was white with buff trimmings, and the fancy shingles in the gables a light and dark slate.

W.R. McDougall, who left Lethbridge for Great Falls a short time earlier, returned to Lethbridge, saying times were tough across the line.

Friday, May 15

Town Inspector Charlie Ross declared war on untagged dogs. A coop was set up at Sam Davis's livery stable. The dogs were to be killed within 48 hours of capture unless tags were bought.

Saturday, May 16

Miss McKibben, the new teacher, arrived on the evening train from Manitoba. She would be the fourth public school teacher.

Sunday, May 17

A silver watch with an open face was missing. William J. Macdonald said it had been lost the night before, and promised a reward to anyone who brought it to him.

Monday, May 18

Members of the Lethbridge Brass Band started practicing for the season, in the company's boarding house No. 2. They were being asked to hold a concert in the public square.

Tuesday, May 19

The Methodist Church was packed for a social evening that raised \$95 for the church building fund. Women of the congregation served a luncheon during breaks in the program, which featured Francis and Mary Ellen Hooker, Messrs Malacord, McNulty and son, and John Sewell.

A daughter was born to Charles F.P. and Ida Conybeare.

Wednesday, May 20

J.M. Harper, dry goods salesman for the Hudson's Bay Co. store, was preparing to leave for a month-long visit to the West Coast. He planned to visit principal cities as far away as San Francisco.

Thursday, May 21

The colliery band gave its first public performance on the town square.

They had a bit of competition from the town's baseball team, which was practicing so it could take on the rivals from Great Falls.

Friday, May 22

John H. Cavanah was renovating the interior of his store to make room for dry goods, hats, caps, boots and shoes.

Saturday, May 23

Mahaffy and McClinskill's store was offering for sale oranges, lemons, apples, coconuts, maple sugar and best white clover honey in the comb.

A cricket match was played between citizens and police and ex-police. The citizens won handily – 108-21.

Sunday, May 24

The Queen's Birthday. Citizens of Lethbridge were able to look their best for the occasion – if they had been at A. Macdonald & Co. the week before. The store had offered men's suits for \$5.

Monday, May 25

Race Day. Trains left the depot every half hour during the afternoon. A train from Great Falls brought about 100 people to the city. About 100 more came from Macleod. A lacrosse team and their fans from Calgary arrived by way of Medicine Hat.

The day featured a lacrosse match between Calgary and Lethbridge – Lethbridge won – as well as the first race meeting of the Lethbridge Turf Association.

Tuesday, May 26

Hardware merchant Arthur Hipperson, who was just back from a 10-day visit to the Mormon colony at Cardston, reported that houses and outbuildings there were a model of taste and completeness. Crops and stock belonging to the colonists were in good shape.

Wednesday, May 27

The Lethbridge Baseball Club started actively looking for members, at \$1 a year. The club, with Henry Bentley as its president, also decided to try for a match in Great Falls on July 4.

Thursday, May 28

The young men of Lethbridge were using the river for bathing. It was a bit too cold for swimming, though.

Two days of rain had followed two days of dry, hot winds, bringing a nicer green to the grass in the area.

Friday, May 29

AR&C general superintendent William Barclay was building a large new house on Redpath Street east. A large addition was being built on F.B. Roberge's Alphonse hotel and restaurant.

Saturday, May 30

A carload of furniture arrived from the east for Charles Payne's new Cosmopolitan Hotel, and was immediately placed in rooms.

A.C. Monroe billed the city \$44.50 for scavenger work he had done.

Sunday, May 31

No services were held at St. Augustine's. Rev. J.F. Pritchard was at the coast.

A few pails of water were needed to extinguish a fire in a barrel behind William Ott's barber shop. But the consequences could have been much work if the fire had not been discovered as quickly as it was.

Monday, June 1

Real estate agent Joseph Ritchie reported he sold 15 lots in the Higinbotham and Colvin addition the week before.

Tuesday, June 2

Horner and Hutchinson completed two fine sets of heavy buckboard harness for D Division of the NWMP at Macleod. The firm was expanding to meet orders coming in from throughout the territories.

Wednesday, June 3

Town council decided to spend \$1,425 on a chemical fire engine, and buy for \$1,000 two lots on Redpath Street next to the Royal Hotel to erect a fire hall. The council decided to raise \$15,000 by debenture – \$5,000 for the fire engine, land, and construction of a fire hall, and \$10,000 for sidewalks and street construction which had already been completed.

Charles Rosaine Sr. suffered a crushed foot while working in the mines. A large chunk of coal fell on it.

May Lawrence, the five-year-old daughter of William and Elizabeth Lawrence, died of scarlet fever.

Thursday, June 4

The rental housing market was in a pinch. The News reported that one family that arrived in Lethbridge was unable to find accommodation, and suggested capitalists could erect a few dwellings to rent.

Friday, June 5

George Rowe had in his livery barn an antelope, about six weeks old, that he had captured

in the mountains the week before. The animal had already become quite tame.

Saturday, June 6

The news of the death of Sir John A. Macdonald reached Lethbridge at about 8:30 p.m., and quickly became the topic of conversation wherever people gathered.

Sunday, June 7

Flags flew at half-mast in memory of Sir John A. Macdonald. Appropriate hymns were sung by the congregation at St. Augustine's. The News said the North West had lost a friend.

Monday, June 8

Marjorie Sherlock advertised the opening of music rooms in the old school building.

Joseph Rudd and his wife had a daughter.

Tuesday, June 9

The Lethbridge lacrosse club was negotiating with the Calgary team regarding

an exhibition tour through Montana cities as well as Salt Lake City. The team was anxious to promote Canada's national game.

Wednesday, June 10

Joseph Bailey, formerly the assistant superintendent of the AR&C, announced he was going into business. Bailey, just back from a holiday on the West Coast, said he would sell furniture from the store previously occupied by John Craig.

Thursday, June 11

Robert Nimmons was elected chief ranger of the Lethbridge court of the C.O.F. Adam Link was the past chief ranger, while James Donaldson was vice-ranger and Thomas Glenwright was recording secretary.

A trestle and approach in the vicinity of shaft No. 2 were being completed.

Tickets went on sale – at \$6 each – for an excursion to Great Falls. The train was to leave July 3 and return two days later.

Saturday, June 13

P.L. Pineo of the Alexander Ranche, about 70 miles east of Lethbridge, was recovering after being treated by Drs. Mewburn and Vidal for a broken leg. Pineo had suffered the injury at a roundup near the forks of the Bow and Belly rivers, when his horse stepped in a hole and fell. Pineo had to lie for several hours on the prairie before a wagon could be brought to take him to Lethbridge for treatment.

A son was born to Mary, the wife of hotelkeeper Frederick Whear.

Sunday, June 14

Sheriff O'Neill, of Benton, Mont., spent the day in

Lethbridge. He had had business at the border crossing, so decided to head north for a look.

Monday, June 15

Worshipful Brother J.B. Walker of North Star Lodge, No. 41, AF&AM, Lethbridge, was appointed Grand Director of Ceremonies by the Masonic Grand Lodge of Manitoba and the North West Territories.

Tuesday, June 16

A team was selected to represent Lethbridge against Great Falls on July 4. J. Netherly would be pitcher, while Al Fiddler would be catcher, William Oliver first base, Joseph Keyes second

base, William Nagle third base, C. Kemp shortstop, and F.D. Higinbotham, John Robinson and G. Pierce in the outfield, William Galliher was spare. A committee was appointed to choose a football team.

In Ottawa, John Abbott became Prime Minister.

Wednesday, June 17

Thomas Battram, of Arthur Hipperson's department store, married Margaret Spencer in West Lorne, Ontario.

Thursday, June 18

A grand ball was held to mark the opening of the new Oddfellows hall in the Stanbury block. About 300 people attended. Refreshments were provided by F.B. Roberge.

Friday, June 19

William Gay was awarded the contract to build the new school house. His successful bid was \$1,100.

W.S. Galbraith was named secretary of the Botanic Club of Canada.

Saturday, June 20

The Misses Milne opened an ice cream and refreshment parlor in the building recently occupied by the late John McNaughton. Cakes, pies and pastry were also offered for sale.

The first railway excursion ever run from Lethbridge carried about 250 people to Conrad for the picnic of employees of the AR&C.

Sunday, June 21

Rev. J.F. Pritchard preached his farewell sermon at St. Augustine's. The church was crowded to the doors to hear the minister, who was leaving for a new post in Montana.

A son was born to John Hawley, hardware merchant, and his wife Annie.

Monday, June 22

Forty one-acre lots north of the tracks were soon to be placed on the market by Joseph Ritchie. The land was owned by James Pearce.

W. McGinnis and Kate Malloy, both of Lethbridge, were married in St. Patrick's Church by Father Van Tighem.

Tuesday, June 23

Three of the four tennis players who would

represent Lethbridge in Great Falls on July 4 were named. John D. Higinbotham, Fred Godwin and W.G. Cleveland would be joined by a fourth player later.

Wednesday, June 24

The football team that would represent Lethbridge in Great Falls was chosen. D. Thompson, W. Robinson, John Niven, W. Scott, J. Wylie, W. McLean, Thomas Graham, William Trow, D. Kerr, A Neidig, and Bruce Latimer were on the team. Robert Scott was named umpire.

Thursday, June 25

J. Netherly, the new pitcher of the ball club, arrived in Lethbridge from Brandon. The team was to practice daily until after the Great Falls match.

Friday, June 26

Examinations for entrance to high school concluded. Nine students – Grace Casey, William Ripley, John Froehlich, Angus Ripley, Edgar Rose, George Stafford, Spurgeon McKay, Edward Greenwood and Annie Paris were writing the tests.

Saturday, June 27

Long and Urch advertised that their Kipp hotel, the halfway house between Lethbridge and Macleod, offered good accommodation for the travelling public. The hotel served as a mail and stage station.

Sunday, June 28

Rev. Robert Halsall preached his last sermon in the Methodist Church. He would spend the summer in Macleod, then head to Winnipeg to attend Wesley College.

Geoffrey D'Eason was named to conduct the services in St. Augustine's Church until a new rector could be appointed.

Monday, June 29

Al Fiddler arrived from Medicine Hat to play for the baseball team.

The regular meeting of the lacrosse club was held. Concern was expressed that there was little interest in practices since the club's easy victory over Calgary on May 25.

Tuesday, June 30

The wife of William Stafford Jr., the former

Gertrude Mary Ash, died at 22 years of age. She had stepped on a rusty nail on June 20, and by the time it was decided to amputate her foot she was too weak to stand the operation.

Schools closed for the summer.

The News announced it would publish just once a week during July.

Wednesday, July 1

Lethbridge residents turned out to celebrate the 24th birthday of the Dominion of Canada. A basket picnic was held at Joseph Noel's place beside the Belly River.

George Rowe ran teams from the Lethbridge House to the picnic ground, charging 35 cents fare.

Thursday, July 2

W.R. Barker was offering to deliver fresh milk to any part of town "on shortest notice." Barker had bought the dairy business of Ross and Arrowsmith.

Friday, July 3

Just hours after Dominion Day celebrations drew to a close, dozens of Lethbridge residents went south to help Great Falls usher in the Fourth of July with a sports day. A train of 10 coaches left the AR&C station at 8:20 a.m., arriving in Great Falls at about 7 p.m.

Saturday, July 4

The Lethbridge contingent in Great Falls was awakened by the sound of a cannon and fire-crackers as Fourth of July celebrations began.

Lethbridge won the baseball game 8-7.

Fred Godwin won the singles tennis match after John D. Higinbotham defaulted. Together they won the doubles match.

The football game ended in a draw.

Sunday, July 5

The Lethbridge contingent arrived home after a 12-hour train ride. Some said it had been the most pleasant weekend in their lives.

Monday, July 6

A son, Charles Richard, was born to Fred Godwin, manager of the Union Bank of Canada, and his wife Anna, sister of Charles Magrath.

Tuesday, July 7

John D. Higinbotham advertised two items that would make the hot summer a bit more liveable. Montserrat Lime Juice had medical properties "recognized as being of great value in hot weather when large quantities of water are used," he said. His store also offered Wilson's Fly Poison Paper and Insect Powder.

Wednesday, July 8

Henry Steele's store north of the railway track had a wide variety of summer games. They included balls, skipping ropes, marbles, slates, scraps and scrap books, lemonade sets, and albums.

Thursday, July 9

J.A. Grant was erecting a large double house on Redpath Street opposite Dr. F.H. Mewburn's residence.

Friday, July 10

Members of the lacrosse club decided to find out if Calgary's team would be available to play on July 25. The Lethbridge team members had barely practiced since beating Calgary in May, and several expressed concern that they were not in shape.

Saturday, July 11

M. Airey opened a bakery in the store previously operated by Henry Pace as a jewellery shop.

Sunday, July 12

Lethbridge residents started mopping up after an overnight rainstorm flooded streets with water. More rain had fallen so far in 1891 than had fallen in all of the previous four years, and farmers were starting to say their fields were too wet.

Monday, July 13

The stage from Macleod didn't make it through. High water in the river meant the ferry at Kipp could not run, so the stage spent the night on the Macleod side. It arrived in Lethbridge one day late.

Tuesday, July 14

Thomas Winnett, the undertaker, received a large stock of coffins, caskets, shrouds and trimmings of every description. He also planned

to have a hearse within a few weeks. He was working out of the new Oddfellows Hall.

Wednesday, July 15

The ferry across the Belly ran again, for the first time since high water forced it to shore Sunday.

John Duff Sr. was having a stone foundation put under his residence.

Thursday, July 16

Anna Godwin was wondering what to do about \$179 sitting in an account in the Union Bank. The money had been raised a year earlier after several churches agreed a fence should be built around the cemetery, but no action had been taken – and Mrs. Godwin was tired of being responsible for the money.

Friday, July 17

The Lethbridge Turf Association was making improvements to its racetrack, including new stable accommodations.

Saturday, July 18

Stockmen in the Pincher Creek area were busy gathering beef to sell to I.G. Baker & Co. The company was paying \$45 for four-year-olds and \$40 for three-year-olds.

Sunday, July 19

The Lethbridge House was near capacity with guests from many areas. They included Miss Zina Young of Salt Lake City, C. Genge of Macleod, A. Hendrix of Kootenay, James Christie of Calgary and Sid Hooper of Kipp.

Monday, July 20

Council passed a bylaw banning houses of ill fame or lewd resort in the town. The bylaw called for fines of at least five dollars, or imprisonment of not more than 30 days, for persons found guilty by a justice of the peace.

Tuesday, July 21

Three of Lethbridge's teachers – Bruce Latimer, A.J. Dove and Ed Hagell – left for a trip to the Kootenay lakes. They planned to be gone for a couple of weeks. Another teacher, Miss McKibben, had already gone to Manitoba for the summer.

Wednesday, July 22

J.W. Robinson's store in the Noel Block featured the latest books and novels, including *In Darkest Africa, Emin Pasha* and *Wealth of Nations*.

John H. Cavanah was closing out his stock of parasols, blouse waists, silk and lisle gloves, and straw hats. Prices were marked down 20 per cent.

Thursday, July 23

Work started on the new school on the north side of the tracks. The building measured 26 feet by 40 feet, and was being built at a cost of \$1,050. It was to be ready by the start of the school year in six weeks.

Friday, July 24

The children of the Knox Church Sunday school held their annual picnic about five miles down the Belly River at Pierce's bottom.

Saturday, July 25

W.R. Barker of Lethbridge and Louisa Chalmbers Bladworth, youngest daughter of a merchant from Edinburgh, were married by Rev. Charles McKillop.

Sunday, July 26

A.A. Vice, at 42 years one of the old–timers of Lethbridge, was buried. He died the day before after being bedridden with heart trouble since the July 4 Great Falls excursion.

Monday, July 27

Dr. Charles Vidal, formerly assistant surgeon for AR&C, left for Neihart, Mont., where he had secured a position with the mines in that district.

An impromptu dance was given by the office employees of the AR&C at William Barclay's new residence.

The new chemical fire extinguisher arrived and was placed at Mr. Mckenzie's wagon shop. Several townspeople went over to have a look.

George McFarquhar, who was one of the contractors of the bridge at Lethbridge, married Emma Rosaine of Lethbridge. The marriage took place in Macleod, where the couple planned to live.

Tuesday, July 28

Lethbridge beat Medicine Hat 90 runs to 89

in a cricket match in the public square.

Wednesday, July 29

James Harper and his family left for Calgary, where they planned to spend about a month before going to Brandon to enter into business.

A son was born to Fredrick Russell, a grocery store clerk, and his wife, Carrie.

Thursday, July 30

There were rumours that Supt. R. Burton

Deane was being removed from the command of the NWMP in Lethbridge.

Friday, July 31

An engine shunting cars on the track west of the station was derailed when it struck a hog that ran onto the track. Engineer Arthur Jardine and Fireman James Patrick were shaken up but otherwise unhurt. A gang of men righted the engine as soon as possible.

Saturday, August 1

The North West Mounted Police were watching the border south of Lethbridge. There had been reports that Blood Indians would be trying to bring into Canada ammunition that they had purchased in Cut Bank.

Sunday, August 2

The hunt was on for members of a volunteer fire brigade. William Colpman was accepting names and planned to call a meeting as soon as enough interest was shown.

Monday, August 3

The new chemical fire extinguisher was tested. A large pile of rubbish was built north of the freight shed and half a barrel of lard oil poured on it. When it was burning well the engine started from Henry Stanbury's block, about a third of a mile away, and had a stream on the fire within three minutes. Onlookers believed the engine would have put out the fire if it hadn't run out of liquid.

The first annual general meeting of the AR&C's Employee Library Society was held. Tom McNabb was returned as president of the

society, which was looking for larger quarters that could also contain a ball room, baths, and a gymnasium.

Tuesday, August 4

William Colpman was named chief of the new volunteer fire brigade at its organizational meeting. William Henderson was first assistant chief, with Manford Freeman second assistant. The brigade had 29 other members. Practices were planned for every Tuesday at 7:30 p.m.,

> and the volunteers were to receive training in the use of the chemical apparatus.

Wednesday, August 5

An ad in the News offered pure-bred Plymouth rock fowl at a bargain price. All the fowl were young and good layers, the ad said.

Thursday, August 6

Mayor Charles Magrath declared that Sept. 10 would be a public holiday in Lethbridge. He said he decided to create the holiday after he

received a petition asking for it.

Friday, August 7

The Methodist Church Sunday School annual picnic was held at Alexander's bottom. It took six or seven wagon loads to take all the children to the site.

Morton Joseph Peters of Rochester, Kent, England, married Emma Harlow, of Walthamstow, Essex, England, at the Presbyterian Manse in Lethbridge.

Saturday, August 8

Arthur Hipperson was having a storeroom added to the rear of his Redpath Avenue hardware store.

Sunday, August 9

The chemical apparatus for fighting fires won a round – by default. A fire in the shack in the coulee behind the roundhouse was reported, and the equipment was hauled down to it. By that time, however, the fire had burned itself out.

Monday, August 10

Charles Farmer drowned in the Belly River while snaking out logs. It was ruled he had drowned accidentally.

The public school re-opened, with all the old teachers returning.

Tuesday, August 11

Sir Alexander T. Galt arrived in Lethbridge for his second visit of 1891.

Several new telephones were put into use, including ones at Mahaffy and McClinskill's store and at Robert Sherlock's residence. John Cavanah's ads in the News featured a headline reading Hello Central.

Wednesday, August 12

The school board presented its budget of \$9,731.68 to town council. The major expense – \$4,890 – was for salaries for the five teachers, a secretary and two caretakers.

Thursday, August 13

Local interests assumed control of the Lethbridge News from E.T. Saunders, who had decided to concentrate his attention on his farm north of town.

Friday, August 14

A phonograph – the first ever in Lethbridge – was on display at Lethbridge House. The phonograph earned a steady string of quarters for the people running the exhibition.

Saturday, August 15

The Scientific American carried a description and illustration of William Bentley's invention, a new car coupling.

The payroll at the AR&C totalled \$28,497.37.

Charles Reed, son of gardener Job Reed, and Mary Barrow, the Reed family's servant girl, were married by Rev. Charles McKillop at the Presbyterian Manse.

Sunday, August 16

Fred Champness was showing a relic that had come into his possession. It was the bleached vertebrae of a buffalo, with the arrow head with which it was struck still in it.

Monday, August 17

A major development north of Lethbridge:

Regular train service started between Calgary and Edmonton. Trains were to run twice a week.

Tuesday, August 18

Patrick Carr closed his tailor's shop in Lethbridge.

Wednesday, August 19

Lethbridge House advertised it had two billiard and pool tables for its clients. It offered Carling's Eastern Ale and Porter on draught. The bar was stocked with cigars, beer, cider, ginger ale, seltzer and soda waters.

Thursday, August 20

J.E. Lethbridge, the accountant for the AR&C, was having a frame house built behind the barracks. The cost was estimated at \$1,500.

Friday, August 21

Steady work had returned to the mines after a period of layoffs, meaning more money was in circulation. Merchants reported that collections were becoming easier.

Saturday, August 22

A daughter was born to Frank W.W. Fane and his wife at Beaver Lake.

Sunday, August 23

The Bishop of Saskatchewan and Calgary and Rev. E.B. Jackson arrived for Jackson's formal induction as rector to St. Augustine's.

Monday, August 24

The Lethbridge Building Co. was scrambling to prepare a temporary stage in their unfinished hall. A troupe from Great Falls wanted to use the building for three nights during the race meeting in September.

Tuesday, August 25

Tickets for a variety of steamship lines – including Cunard, White Star and Dominion – were available in Lethbridge. Herbert Martin was the agent in town for about 20 lines.

Wednesday, August 26

The News reported that inventors were at work on something called an aeroplane. "By setting planes at an angle to the currents of air the machine is expected to balance itself as a

bird floats poised upon its wings. Then the aeroplane will be driven through the air by a steam engine," the News reported. It didn't give an estimate as to when one of the contraptions would be ready.

Thursday, August 27

The \$40,000 bridge over the Belly River was complete and ready for use – almost. No effort had been made to province an approach on the west side of the river, making the bridge useless but keeping the ferry operator happy.

Friday, August 28

Lethbridge would be represented in the North West Assembly after the next election, it was announced. A new riding was also created in Banff.

Saturday, August 29

Fred Godwin, manager of the Lethbridge branch of the Union Bank, brought glory to the city by winning the lawn tennis championship of Manitoba and the North West Territories, as well as the Hudson's Bay Cup. The competition was held in Lethbridge.

Sunday, August 30

The lacrosse and baseball teams were hard at work practicing every night. The rugby club was also busy, but practised only every Monday and Thursday evening.

Monday, August 31

The Lethbridge Building Co. gave up its desperate attempt to get the hall ready by Sept. 10. The Great Falls theatre company, it was decided, would have to use the barracks mess room instead.

Tuesday, September 1

Father Lacombe, who was instrumental in bringing Roman Catholic teachings to the territories, visited Lethbridge. Father Rene Remas, who was Lacombe's first companion in the Saskatchewan district about 40 years earlier, arrived in the town as well to visit Lacombe.

Joseph Bailey, former AR&C superintendent, received a gold locket and chain from employees of the company.

Wednesday, September 2

John Fraser Jr., a cook, and May Elizabeth

Wilson, a dressmaker, were married by Rev. Charles McKillop. The groom gave the bride a gold watch. Mr. and Mrs. William Stafford gave the couple a china tea set, while W.S. Galbraith gave a photo album.

A son, Harold Stewart, was born to Mr. and Mrs. A.W. Buchanan.

Thursday, September 3

Members of the Christian Endeavor of Knox Church held a gathering at Mr. Grant's new double house.

Friday, September 4

R. Burton Deane, the superintendent commanding the NWMP in Lethbridge, called for tenders for supplies. The force needed 10,000 bushels of oats for its horses and 600 bushels of potatoes for its men.

Saturday, September 5

Professor C.D. Nedham, who billed himself as an expert piano and organ tuner, was in town to ply his craft.

Sunday, September 6

A list of the town's voters was put on display at the post office.

Monday, September 7

Church of England Rev. E.B. Jackson married Thomas Scott, a laborer, and Jane Ogden. Both were from Yorkshire.

Tuesday, September 8

The NWMP were interested in dealing. The police were looking for about 25 well-broken saddle horses, and offered for sale a few cast police horses.

Wednesday, September 9

"If you want to be driving your girlie about, you should take a cash trip in Sam's dashing turn out." Sam Davis tried poetry to advertise his new rental cart that had just arrived.

Thursday, September 10

Civic holiday. Trains ran between the bus depot and the track from noon to 2:30 p.m., and returning starting at 5:30 p.m. Tickets were one dollar each.

The day featured lacrosse, with Regina versus Lethbridge, and Great Falls versus Leth-

bridge in baseball and football.

Musical and dramatic entertainment was offered at the barracks. Lethbridge won at lacrosse, football and baseball.

Friday, September 11

The man who came to Lethbridge to demonstrate the phonograph sent a special present to Thomas Edison, the man who invented the machine. The gift was a cylinder featuring Three Bulls, who spoke into the machine during a stop at Gleichen.

Saturday, September 12

The Hudson's Bay Co. offered a wide range of goods. The store featured boots, shoes, and clothing – but also sold Schuttler wagons and the Brantford mower.

Sunday, September 13

Samples of grain, vegetables and fruits from the Lethbridge area were being gathered for shipment to the Winnipeg Industrial Exhibition. Henry Bentley, chairman of the town's immigration committee, was in charge of the project.

Monday, September 14

Alicia Rookes' kindergarten class was taken to hear selections on the phonograph. They were delighted by the "machine that spoke".

Tuesday, September 15

The \$10,000 debenture bylaw was put to the voters – and was approved. Only 38 people voted, with 36 in favor of the proposal.

Lawyer William Galliher married Miss E.D. Carman in Winnipeg. They left by train for Lethbridge as soon as the ceremony was over.

Wednesday, September 16

The territorial government announced that \$7,000 was in the budget to erect a new customs house and court house in Lethbridge – but the News called the amount ridiculously inadequate. Lethbridge needed a court house similar to the one in Calgary, so a budget of \$30,000 was needed, the paper said.

The government also said it would spend \$7,000 to complete the Belly River bridge.

Thursday, September 17

A Guild of St. Hilda rummage sale raised \$200 for new books for the St. Augustine's

Sunday school. Three stalls, filled with all kinds of embroidered, hand-painted, knitted and other articles were offered. Later, a concert was held.

Friday, September 18

Henry Bentley was advertising a new stock of Pittsburg lamps, hanging lamps, and glassware at his store.

Saturday, September 19

Two prairie fires were visible from the town. The fires were blamed on dry weather and the thicker-than-usual crop of grass.

Sunday, September 20

Boys were causing problems in the town, using windows – even the ones in the churches – as targets for their catapults. They were given stern reprimands.

Monday, September 21

Henry Bentley told council that he had received only four samples of grain and roots, and they were not representative of what could be grown in the area. He would, therefore, not bother sending samples to the show in Winnipeg.

But building inspector J.B. Moore, who left for Winnipeg because his work at the Galt Hospital was finished, took samples of the area's diamond willow.

Tuesday, September 22

The building formerly known as the No. 1 Boarding House became home to the AR&C Employees' Library and Reading Room.

Wednesday, September 23

Robert Doull, formerly the Conservative MP for Pictou, Nova Scotia, was in town taking care of the Dominion Lands Office. George Young, the manager, was away to be married.

Thursday, September 24

Mary Glendinning offered in her store the fall and winter stock of millinery and fancy goods, as well as ladies' jackets and underwear and children's hand-made hoods.

Friday, September 25

A son was born to William and Jane McArthur. Mr. MacArthur was a hotel and storekeeper.

Saturday, September 26

Horner and Hutchinson were showing off two new sets of driving harness which they said

could be hard to match elsewhere in the North West. Both were made from the best oak-tanned leather, with hard rubber mountings. One set went to the Brown Ranche, the other to Pincher Creek.

Sunday, September 27

Much progress was being shown in medical matters. Canadians were able to buy – from a company in Toronto – electric belts that were said to cure rheumatism, kidney diseases, spinal diseases and many, many other ailments. Another popular product, said to cure the same problems, was Burdock Blood Bitters.

Monday, September 28

The town was sending out its tax notices. Payments were to be sent directly to William Galliher, the town's lawyer.

Tuesday, September 29

Ed Higinbotham

returned to Lethbridge after spending several weeks in Ontario, where he had gone hoping to recover from the injuries he suffered in the Schreiber rail accident.

Wednesday, September 30

With the economic downturn there weren't many jobs available. William Henderson was, however, looking for a chambermaid for his Lethbridge House.

Thursday, October 1

Lieutenant-Colonel W.M. Herchmer of the NWMP, along with his wife and daughter, arrived by train, then left for Macleod.

Henry Bentley, W.G. Cleveland and a man named Steele headed out for some hunting – and came back with a dozen chickens, some

ducks and a rabbit.

Friday, October 2

Lilias Sage, the wife of Robert Sage, a clerk at the AR&C, gave birth to a daughter. It was their fifth child.

Saturday, October 3

Mr. McKnight won \$300 in Carslake's St. Leger sweep.

Sunday, October 4

No service at St. Augustine's because Rev. E.B. Jackson was suffering from a sore throat.

Monday, October 5

The Reading Room and Library Society decided to form a dramatic and literary club. Timothy Dunn, a machinist, and Will Waghorn, a painter, were empowered to start planning. The first entertainment was planned for later in the month.

Tuesday, October 6

An impromptu dance

was given by the members of the tennis club in the large hall of the Reading Room and Library Society.

Wednesday, October 7

Residents of Lethbridge were still waiting for the postal inspector for the territories to respond to their petition seeking the post office be opened on Sundays. Lethbridge was the only town in the territories with daily service that did not have Sunday openings.

Thursday, October 8

Lawyer Thomas Clarke was laid up with a bad leg. He had hurt it with a nail while bathing

about three months earlier, but had ignored the injury. He finally needed to have an operation on his leg.

Friday, October 9

A child of Charles and Jane Gillies died of blood poisoning. Apparently a large black spider had bitten the child on the eyelid, causing the death.

Saturday, October 10

Workers were putting the finishing touches on the building company's hall.

George Robinson's store was selling its stock of wallpaper at cost. A good selection was reported.

Sunday, October 11

Henry Bentley was trying to smooth ruffled feathers. He told townspeople that the crop samples he had been given were really firstrate, but there simply weren't enough to put together a representative sample for the Winnipeg fair.

Monday, October 12

The Lethbridge customs outpost was raised to being a port of entry. The decision was made because of the amount of business being done. Coutts would serve as an outpost under Lethbridge. Fred Champness would continue in his post as collector.

Tuesday, October 13

James McKay was back in Lethbridge after a trip to the B.C. Rockies. He had made it as far west as Donald, north of Golden.

Wednesday, October 14

Postmaster John D. Higinbotham entered the fray about having the post office open Sundays. He said few post offices in the dominion were open on Sundays, and the post office in Lethbridge was already trying to meet the public's needs by keeping its money order and savings bank office open until 6 p.m. six days a week.

Signor Bosco, the renowned magician, appeared in the building company's hall.

Maria, the wife of Howard Greenwood, the AR&C auditor, gave birth to a son.

Friday, October 16

One man was struck with a hammer after a

fight in a restaurant on Round Street. Another man was found guilty and sentenced to two months in jail, but escaped to Montana.

Saturday, October 17

Streets of Lethbridge were filled with members of the Blood and Piegan Indian bands, who had just received their treaty payments. About \$14,000 was handed to the two bands.

Mary, the wife of John Callahan, a locomotive engineer, gave birth to a daughter.

Sunday, October 18

C.D. Nedham, a representative of Mason and Risch, the Toronto piano manufacturers, was in town to tune pianos and organs. Orders could be left at the post office.

A daughter was born to J.R. Davis and his wife.

Monday, October 19

The town advertised for tenders for the planting of 200 trees on the public square. Fifty per cent of the agreed price would be paid on completion of the contract, with the balance to be paid based on the number of trees still alive on May 1, 1893.

Tuesday, October 20

George Harding was found guilty of furious driving. Capt. R. Burton Deane ordered him to pay one dollar.

William McArthur, an old resident of Lethbridge, died of heart disease.

Wednesday, October 21

A dance was held under the auspices of the Reading Room and Library Society.

Thursday, October 22

A miner named Andrewpop suffered a serious accident while working on the incline railway. His legs were caught in the wheels of one of the cars.

Friday, October 23

Walter Huckvale of Kipp was about to leave on an extended vacation. He planned to be back in his native England for about six months.

Saturday, October 24

George Michie of the Union Bank left to take a position with the bank in Carberry, Man.

Sunday, October 25

A man named F.B. Spence addressed audiences in the Methodist and Presbyterian churches on the subject of prohibition. Ninety-eight people signed pledges that they would abstain from the use of alcohol.

Monday, October 26

Shots were fired between police and Blood Indians for the first time since the arrival of the police in 1874. Two policemen looking for whiskey outfits found eight Indians with meat they had just killed, and one officer and one Indian were wounded in the exchange of gunfire that followed.

Tuesday, October 27

John Higinbotham's drug and book store had a selection of new titles in stock, including Diary of a Pilgrimage, Jerome, Why I Am What I Am, A Dead Man's Diary, French Self Taught, and Guide to Health.

George Rowe, who ran a livery stable, and his wife had a baby boy.

Wednesday, October 28

Jeweller A.F. Tero announced plans to move his business from Redpath Street to Round Street in November. He planned to erect a building between the post office and Sherlock and Higinbotham's store.

Thursday, October 29

The first snow of the winter put out grass fires that had been burning south and east of Lethbridge.

Friday, October 30

Charles Turner said Lethbridge's electric light system would likely be in operation by Christmas. "We are going to put in incandescent lights so cheap as to make people put coal oil lamps away on the shelves," he said.

Miss McKibben's room in the public school was used in the evening for a recital of the children. The concert marked the departure of teacher Lena Simpson for her home in Ottawa.

Saturday, October 31

Nominations for members of the North West legislature took place between 12 noon and 2 p.m. at the building company's hall. The only person seeking the post was Charles Magrath.

His nomination papers were signed by lumber merchant William Bentley, Hugh McBeth, lawyer William Galliher, lawyer Charles F.P. Conybeare, and William Colpman.

A son was born to Frank D. and Esther Smythe.

Sunday, November 1

Rev. A.B. Haines of Macleod occupied the pulpit of the Methodist church. He was on his way to Brandon to attend a meeting of the Conference Missionary Committee.

Monday, November 2

Town council offered to provide a site for the proposed court house, and said the \$7,000 in the territorial budget should be used for a foundation for a building that would be worth \$20,000.

The Reading Room and Library Society decided on new hours – 1 p.m. to 10 p.m. daily, with books to be given out every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Sunday hours were 1 p.m to 9 p.m.

Tuesday, November 3

The Knights of Pythias Society held its first meeting in the new hall, which would soon be the scene of theatricals given by Capt. R. Burton Deane's company. Seats for the hall came from London, Ont., and some of the scenery came from Chicago.

Wednesday, November 4

Charles Turner promised that the town's new electric light system would be in operation by Christmas.

Thursday, November 5

Police broke up a quiet game of dice being played in a local restaurant.

Saturday, November 7

After three motions lost, town council decided on a site for the new fire hall. It would be on a 50-foot by 100-foot lot on the west end of lots 1,2,3 and 4 of Block 18. The land would be purchased from Henry Bentley.

Sunday, November 8

Little Charles Burton Magrath, the son of the mayor, suffered a broken arm in a fall down the cellar stairs. He had broken his arm in the same spot about two months earlier.

Monday, November 9

Council decided the new fire hall would be a two-storey brick building with an iron roof. Part of the basement would contain cells and the upper storey would contain council chambers and two rooms for the clerk. The building was to be 28 feet wide by 36 feet long. Council decided to start seeking tenders for the fire hall.

A group of men headed south to help repair a bridge on the Great Falls and Canada Railway which had been destroyed by fire. Two trains a day had been using the route, so the stoppage – expected to be about four days – was a great inconvenience.

Henry and John Howard, who had been given the contract to plant trees in the public square, had all the holes dug.

Tuesday, November 10

Nora Clench was a disappointment in her Lethbridge concert – she failed to show. But local talent sprang into action. The splendid voice of Dr. DeVeber, a piano solo by Marjorie Sherlock, and a recitation by James Malkin were among the treats given.

James Fraser, son of John and Annie Fraser, died at the age of 19 years and seven months. He had suffered from consumption for about two months.

A girl was born to Francis and Mary Ellen Hooper/Hooker.

Wednesday, November 11

Lethbridge market quotations featured a ton of coal at \$3.50, a ton of hay at \$12 to \$15, a pound of butter for 30 cents, a pound of cheese at 15 cents, and 100 pounds of potatoes for one dollar.

School children were given a holiday because the furnace was smoking so badly they could not stay in the rooms.

Thursday, November 12

Thanksgiving Day. Stores in Lethbridge were closed, but had been kept open later than normal the night before.

A union service of the Methodist and Presbyterian churches was held.

A shooting meet was held at the Alberta Gun Club practice grounds. Then, 20 horsemen took part in a coyote hunt. A football game followed.

Friday, November 13

Robert Sherlock was elected president of the Board of Trade, which was revived after several months of inactivity. John D. Higinbotham was elected vice-president. The major issue discussed was the possibility of a fence around the cemetery.

Saturday, November 14

William Oliver, who submitted a tender for \$3,326, was awarded the contract to build the new fire hall. George Cody and G. Cluston submitted losing bids.

Sunday, November 15

A total eclipse of the moon was seen by many. When the eclipse began at about 5:50 p.m., the moon was obscured by clouds, but they soon cleared, allowing the phenomenon to be seen.

The post office lobby was opened to box holders for one hour, from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m., on the order of the post office department. The opening was to be done every Sunday.

Monday, November 16

Park Lowther, a butcher, was named select councillor of the new Progress branch of the Royal Templars of Temperance. Thomas Glenwright, a blacksmith, was made vice—councillor, with Rev. Charles McKillop as chaplain.

Rail traffic was disrupted when an engine jumped off the rails just east of the station.

Tuesday, November 17

Thomas McCaugherty suffered a compound fracture of one of his legs when he fell off his wagon near Kipp. One of the wheels of the wagon rolled over him.

A horse was killed when seven loaded cars of coal went hurtling down the incline railway. About 20 miners were briefly trapped inside the mine at the bottom because of debris from the drift, which collapsed. The men were warned not to follow loaded cars up the incline.

Wednesday, November 18

Mrs. A Moran gave birth to a daughter. Mr. Rowley on the violin, accompanied by Fred Ahlin on piano, entertained at the library hall.

Thursday, November 19

Town council suspended its pound bylaw in respect to cattle. Council members felt it would be almost impossible to keep cattle out of the town during the winter, so the bylaw should not be enforced until March 1.

Friday, November 20

The game of crokinole – said to be all the rage down east – arrived in Lethbridge. Little and Cleveland's store was reported to have a good stock of the boards.

Saturday, November 21

Members of the COF organized an oyster supper at Riverside Park. About 20 people gathered at the Park Hotel where the hosts were Joseph and Mary Noel.

Sunday, November 22

Samuel Brady, a baker, and his wife Annie gave birth to a daughter.

Monday, November 23

The foundation for the new fire hall, at Ford and Smith streets, was being dug.

The first of two concerts to raise money for the new hospital was held. The second was set for the next day.


Tuesday, November 24

Council decided to advertise for a block of at least 10 lots within town limits for the site of the new court house.

Wednesday, November 25

E.T. Saunders again assumed proprietorship of the News.

The Masonic Ball was held. The evening's entertainment consisted of 24 dances.



Thursday, November 26

Little and Clevelend ordered more crokinole boards because the first batch had been sold out. The game was taking Lethbridge by storm – and replacing cinch and poker as the games of choice.

Friday, November 27

Star gazers, fresh from watching the total eclipse of the moon, were out again in force for a meteorite shower. It never showed.

Saturday, November 28

The crokinole craze was getting a bit of competition from new games being sold in Higinbotham's store. Cuckoo and Tiddly Winks were proving to be hot sellers.

Sunday, November 29

Another windy day in Lethbridge – and the new trees in the public square were being blown over.

William Henderson and his wife had a daughter. Henderson was proprietor of Lethbridge House.

Monday, November 30

William Colpman who had secured a leave of absence from council for the remainder of his term, left for an extended visit to the Old Country.

Two major social events were held – an evening of dramatic entertainment to aid the library, and a St. Andrew's Supper.

Tuesday, December 1

The Canadian Pacific Railway advertised a special on train tickets during Decem-

ber. The price of a return ticket between Lethbridge and Montreal was set at \$62.50.

Wednesday, December 2

Council's decision that the pound bylaw would not be enforced through the winter drew criticism from an unexpected source – the Howard brothers. Their landscaping contract with the city specified they would be paid according to the number of trees still alive on the public square a few years hence. As long as the bylaw wasn't being enforced, they were losing money – because cattle were knocking the trees over.

Thursday, December 3

Ben Whitney was starting to put a fence around the cemetery grounds. He would get \$400 for the work, although the Board of Trade had less than half that amount in its account. A drive was planned to raise the remainder before the end of the month, when the work was expected to be finished.

Friday, December 4

An artesian well, which would provide the town with a steady flow of water, was being considered by members of the Board of Trade. The well would be drilled within town limits during the winter. Board members felt the well could be completed at minimal cost to the town.

Saturday, December 5

Lethbridge's Catholic school was much improved, according to the latest inspection. The school had 42 students in the senior department and 35 in the junior department.

Sunday, December 6

Skating on the river became a popular pastime, although skaters were being warned the ice wasn't really thick enough – and the water was too cold for a swim.

Monday, December 7

The town's chemical fire fighting apparatus was given its first major test – and failed miserably.

During the supper hour flames were noticed at the rear of the J.H. Lawrence furniture store at Smith and Redpath streets. High winds drove the flames to the Royal Hotel, about 20 feet away. The chemical apparatus was brought to the scene but was cast to one side as it proved to be useless.

The furniture store and the hotel collapsed within about 15 minutes. An adjacent building, owned by Thomas Denton and used by Agnes McNaughton as a boarding house, was also enveloped by the blaze.

A stable at the rear of the A. Macdonald general store also caught on fire as volunteers emptied goods from several stores that were threatened, including Little and Cleveland's drug store. Lawrence McEwan's jewellery store, the butcher shop owned by Park Lowther and Blair Carter, and John Hawley's hardware store. Some of the goods were stolen after they were piled on the street.

The butcher shop was torn down to try to stop the blaze from spreading, but the fire reached Macdonald's store, causing about \$50,000 in damage.

Enough water was finally brought to the scene to fight the fire, and a brick building and wet blankets stopped the spread. High winds carried burning embers to other parts of town, causing several small fires.

Tuesday, December 8

Council's regular meeting was a day late, because its members had been fulfilling their civic duty – by fighting the big fire the night before.

A request from the NWMP that two streets be closed was approved by council. The land was needed for police use. One closure was between Ashmead Street and Coutts Street, south of the barracks; the other was Cutbill Street between the barracks and Courtland Street.

A bylaw that would allow the electric company to erect poles and wires was proposed by Charles Turner.

Wednesday, December 9

John Gurn's Winnipeg Restaurant offered an oyster supper, raffle and musical entertainment.

John M. Parsons, an agent for the Ronald Fire Engine Co., arrived in Lethbridge. He tried to arrange a town meeting, but had to settle for an address to council members. He told them that a hand fire engine with tanks or a complete system of waterworks and an engine would be the best choice for the town. No decision was made.

The Board of Trade decided to try to raise \$3,000 by subscription to sink an artesian well. About \$1,100 was raised in the first day.

Thursday, December 10

Hotelkeeper David Clark was trying to find two volumes of Stanley's *Darkest Africa*, bound in half leather, that had gone missing the night of the fire.

The Cosgrove family entertained in the building company's hall. The act featured a vairety of musical instruments, from cow bells to tiny wine glasses, as well as a comedian.

Friday, December 11

The Howard brothers won, and the cattle lost, when council members finally relented and reconsidered their suspension of the pound bylaw. Cattle, they decided, would no longer be allowed to roam the public square.

The fire was still on the minds of council members, who talked about imposing tough new limits on construction in Lethbridge. Brick, concrete, or stone would be the materials of choice downtown.

A work crew left town to repair the Great Falls and Canada Railway bridge at Stirling, which had been destroyed by fire. Rail traffic was disrupted for just one day.

Saturday, December 12

Twelve-year-old Mary Jane Sewell, the daughter of pump inspector Jonathon Sewell and his wife Elizabeth, won \$10 in a contest in Alicia Rookes's kindergarten. Eveline McKay, daughter of Daniel and May, placed second.

Sunday, December 13

The young daughter of Robert and Nancy Ripley died.

Monday, December 14

Charles A. Magrath left for Regina to take his seat in the territorial assembly. He was also on the committee of management for the opening of a new hotel in Winnipeg on Dec. 31.

Tuesday, December 15

Winnipeg businessman Alex Macdonald, the biggest loser in the big fire, had some good news as he worked taking stock in Lethbridge. He had won the mayor's chair in Winnipeg by a wide margin. Macdonald gave \$50 to the Leth-

bridge fire brigade in thanks for its efforts the night of the blaze.

Wednesday, December 16

Most of the businessmen were getting back into action, restocking their stores, but Henry Bentley had decided he would not rebuild the Royal Hotel.

J.H. Lawrence was still debating what to do, and Agnes McNaughton had rented space in the Alphonse Hotel to continue her boarding house business.

Thursday, December 17

Dave Akers's ranch at Fort Whoop–Up, about six miles from Lethbridge at the junction of the St. Mary's and Belly rivers, was being advertised for sale for \$2,000. Lawyers Conybeare and Galliher were handling the deal.

Friday, December 18

More than \$300 was raised by members of the Knox Church Ladies Aid at a bazaar.

Saturday, December 19

It was a gorgeous day, with matches of lawn tennis taking place. But it was impossible to get a true reading of the day's weather, because the instruments – set up in the public square – had been broken. Henry Pace, who was in charge of taking the daily meteorological readings, said later he had seen someone running away from the site of the instruments.

Sunday, December 20

The new catalog from the AR&C library showed it had 522 volumes, including works of history, biography, travel and adventure.

Monday, December 21

Two companies were seeking permission to put electric lights into Lethbridge, and both said they could not give an estimate on cost until the new year. The delay forced councillor Charles Turner, who was involved in one of the companies, to drop out of the race for the mayor's chair.

Town council met, but decided to table several matters so they could be handled by the council to be elected in January.

A. Macdonald and Co. opened a new store at the corner of Smith and Redpath streets.

Tuesday, December 22

Emma Hipperson, 15-year-old daughter of Arthur Hipperson, received a gold watch and chain from the Knox Church congregation. The special presentation was made in thanks for her work as an organist.

Wednesday, December 23

The Bell Telephone Co.'s new list of subscribers showed there were 66 telephones in Lethbridge. Some of the smarter businessmen had even secured advertising space in the pamphlet.

Thursday, December 24

Frank Ford brought the body of a man to the NWMP detachment at St. Mary's, southwest of

Lethbridge. Before the coroner could arrive to examine the body, however, Ford made a successful dash into the United States. It turned out the man had been murdered.

Syrup of Figs, which acts "in harmony with nature" to cleanse the system, was on sale at John D. Higinbotham's drug store. Bottles were 75 cents each.

Friday, December 25

Christmas Day. The weather was anything but pleasant, with a strong wind blowing all day. The News reported that private social gatherings and quiet family parties constituted the greater part of the day's enjoyment.

A dinner was given at the barracks for expolicemen, and the Clark House and Lethbridge House gave public dinners.

Saturday, December 26

Lawyer William Galliher went to Macleod for a special sitting of court. A man had been accused of stealing a horse.

Sunday, December 27

John D. Higinbotham was chairman of the Presbyterian Sunday School's Christmas Tree celebration in the building company's hall. The children gave a recital, then Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus arrived.

Monday, December 28

Henry Bentley won the 1892 mayor's chair by acclamation on nomination day.

Thirteen people were nominated for council seats. They were Fred Bourdon, Malcolm McKenzie, Norman T. Macleod, William Henderson, Tom McNabb, Job Reed, Charles Magrath, John Bruce, John D. Higinbotham, William Colpman, M.S. Campbell, and J.L. Stovell.

Campbell later pulled out of the race. The election was set for the following Monday.

A Christmas Tree and entertainment under the auspices of the Methodist Sunday school

was held in the church. Rev. J.H. Morgan received several messages from Santa Claus, who was on his way from England, before Saint Nick finally arrived.

Tuesday, December 29

A mining town incorporated February, 1891, at the terminus of the Alberta Railway and Coal. Co., 110 miles from Dunmore station, on the main line of the C.P.R. 10 miles east of Medicine Hat, and is 28 miles east of Fort Macleod. Has a board of trade; semi-weekly newspaper; Presbyterian, Methodist, Church of England, and roman Catholic churches, and public and R.C. separate school. Telephone, public library and reading room. Masonic Lodge, Oddfellows, Knights of Pythias and Foresters, and Sons of Temperance. Has money order post office, express and telegraph offices. Pop. 2500. The principal industry is the coal mine, worked by the Alberta Railway and Coal Co., who also have a saw mill and the terminal shops of their railway here. There are other coal mines in the vicinity, and cattle ranching is extensively carried on.

Springhill relief

A fund-raising campaign started in Lethbridge days after an explosion at a mine in Springhill, Nova Scotia, killed more than 100 men on Feb. 21, 1891.

Many of Lethbridge's miners had moved there from Nova Scotia the November before, and had friends and relatives among the dead. Brothers of at least two Lethbridge residents, Frank Crawford and Angus Corrigan, died in the Springhill blast. Lethbridge Mayor Charles A. Magrath sent a cheque for \$1,622.30 to Springhill on April 17.

Dominion Census

This is an index to the 1891 Dominion Census, Lethbridge Sub-District, Alberta, Northwest Territories.

Enumerator W.S. Heron started a list of people in the Lethbridge area on April 10, 1891, and completed it on July 1.

The census for the Lethbridge sub-district includes 2,842 names on 114 sheets. The area covered – basically, from Lethbridge south to the United States border – was huge, measuring at least 50 miles north to south, and includes the Lee's Creek Mormon settlement, now known as Cardston.

The census itself has much more information than appears in this index. It is available on FHL microfilm 1465850 or National Archives of Canada microfilm T-6425. This census has also been indexed in the Alberta-wide index published in 1998 by the Regina branch of the Saskatchewan Genealogical Society. The SGS index also has more information than will be found here.

Spellings are as they appeared in handwriting. In some cases, this means three different spellings for one family name.

There are four columns of information – name, age, birthplace and page on the census where the entry will be found. A (P) means the person was a member of the North West Mounted Police.
